## Hitomiza Otome Bunraku

Hitomiza Otome Bunraku is one of Japanese traditional puppet shows, Ningyo Joruri; the group has presented performances and workshops in Japan and other countries.

While a bunraku puppet is manipulated by three male puppeteers,

a otome-bunraku puppet is performed by solo female puppeteer.

Its appearance is similar to a Bunraku puppet, but its mechanism had been restructured to fit solo puppeteer.

The three-puppeteer style enables rich and delicate expression that is highly recognized worldwide today; on the other hand, Otome Bunraku is the method to do so with solo puppeteer.

#### International Exchange

The Center is linked to puppetry of the world in various ways.

From 1987 to 1997, the Center organized an international puppet festival in a number of cities in Japan,

introducing puppet shows mainly from Western countries; as a result,

there were total of 56 companies from 20 countries,

including Italy, the Netherlands, France and the United States, etc.

Since 1993, the Center invites Asian puppet company every year; from traditional group to modern theater.

So far, the invitees were 15 companies from 11 regions including India,

Indonesia, Myanmar, Laos, Cambodia, China, etc.

Since 2007 in Japan, the Center has organized International Exchange Workshops among Asian puppet companies.

The goal of the project is; to encourage the puppeteers to learn unique culture

and techniques among each other for their inheritance and creation, and to form humane network in future.

Three sessions of the project are completed.

In addition, the Center introduces Japanese puppet companies to other countries.

Whenever it receives a request from foreign organizations

such as an international festival or a puppet theater in any nation,

it sends Japanese puppet companies for performance.





### Karakuri Ningyo

The Center has produced the exhibition of Japanese traditional Karakuri Ningyo.

Karakuri Ningyo are puppets with sophisticated mechanism, that could be recognized as robots in old days.

Their history could be traced back for 300 years, and even today they are performed in traditional festivals all over Japan.

The Center noticed this valuable tradition, and researched the art through field works in local venues.

The exhibits are qualified replicas; there are approximately 40 of them available.

Each of them will be exhibited any time, accompanied by performance and lecture by experts.

Recently, Karakuri Ningyo is evaluated as a root of Japanese scientific technology,

and the exhibition took place in various counties in Asia, Middle East and Europe.



The Center is in charge of rebuilding, repairing and construction of Japanese traditional puppets.

Recently, modern artists and contemporary dancers requested puppets for their creation.

The Center meets various requests, and takes care of puppets through the methods gained after years of study.

#### Research and Publication

One of the main projects of the Center is research of puppetry in Japan and overseas.

Its outcome is open to public through performances, exhibitions and publications.

Tradition of puppetry is superb in Japan, and many of them are active in their local community.

The Center researches the status of Japanese traditional puppetry and how those cultural heritages are maintained.

In other 27 countries in Asia, Europe and America, the Center makes research on traditional and modern puppetry.

The Publication project has produced more than 44 publications

such as the translation of qualified books on foreign puppetry,

journals of traditional puppetry, research reports, etc.

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
